## HANDS ON ART

### Paper Plate Umbrellas

Give each of your children a paper plate with a small hole poked in the middle. Let the children decorate the backs of their plates with crayons or felt tip pens. When they have finished, let them stick their index fingers up through the holes in their plates to make "Umbrellas".

### Listen to the Raindrops

*Sung to "Frère Jacques"*

Rain on my umbrella  
Never stops.  
Drip, drip, drop.

## SNACK IDEA

Wrap snack foods in aluminium foil or waxed paper and serve them from a child-size umbrella.

## MOVEMENT

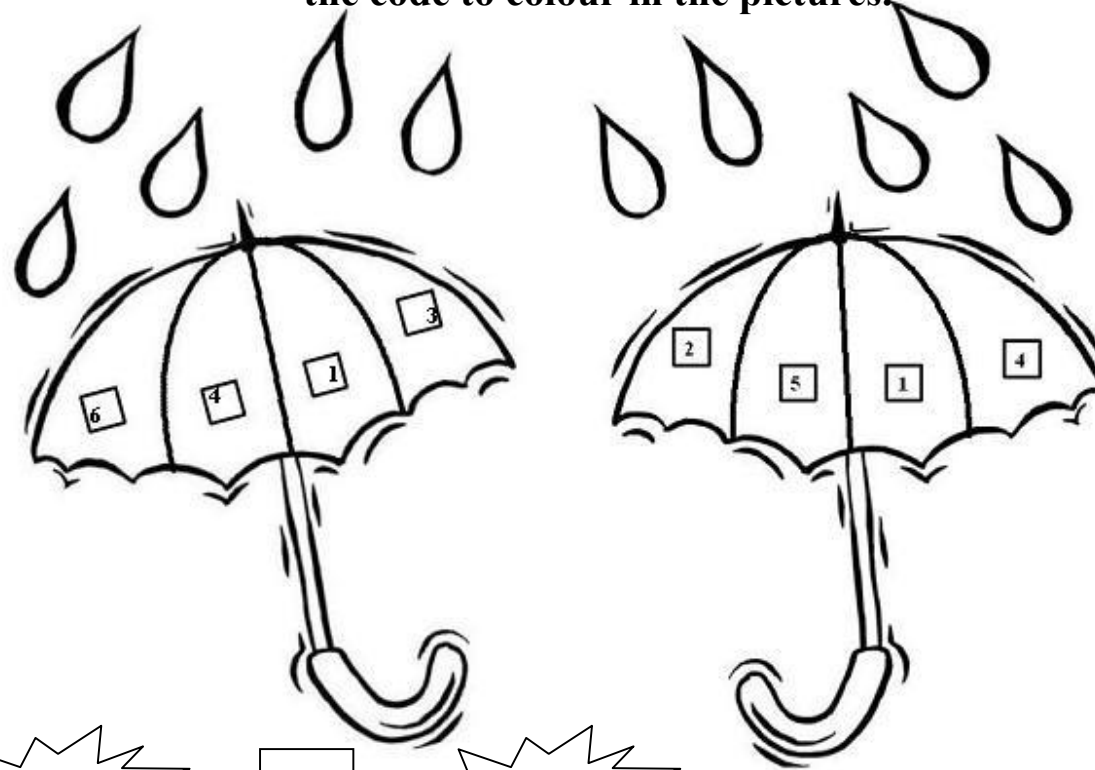
### Umbrella Moves

Let your children walk around like closed umbrellas with their arms straight down. Every now and then, tap out some rain sounds and let the "umbrellas" pretending to open up by raising their arms and holding them out at the sides. 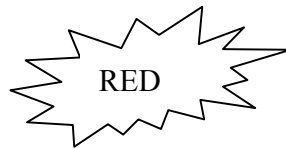
## LANGUAGE IDEA

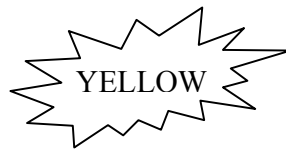

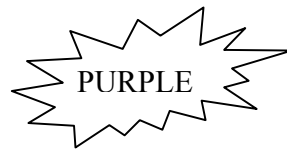
